Our point of difference is that, through our music mentoring and wellbeing programmes, rangatahi are able to directly engage and connect with experienced professionals working in the creative industries.




#### **Our Mission**

## Message from our CEO

I am excited to share our first-ever annual impact report. At Crescendo, we are pioneering the social enterprise model which not only provides funds for self-sustainability but allows us to stay true to our kaupapa. It is proof that both impact and revenue can be balanced.

When I became Crescendo's CEO, my vision focused on strengthening and sustaining our impact and remaining relevant in the youth and creative cultures. Deepening impact drives every aspect of our organisation.

Crescendo's Youth Advisory Group was formed so that our rangatahi /young people could input directly on what is important to them and how we continue to stay relevant and responsive to their needs. We take a youth-centred approach to our mahi and aim to drop our wellbeing rocks into the pond and watch them ripple and grow.

Crescendo's five-year plan is ambitious and anchored in wellbeing and transitional youth pathways. We are focused on equipping our rangatahi with a combination of technical and soft skills. We are growing our vocational and educational pathways to tautoko/uplift our rangatahi into paid opportunities in the creative industries. We are creating a safe and open space to prepare and nurture our rangatahi for future work in the 'gig economy'.

Our long-term goals include a new whare/studio from which we can operate our two entities: our **profit-for-purpose Crescendo Studio** and our **not-for-profit Crescendo Trust**. We are tapping into Crescendo's entrepreneurial spirit, which includes influencing the industry from the bottom up and changing the face of the creative industries.

Thank you to our amazing supporters. We wouldn't be where we are today without you. This is your chance to reflect and soak up the aroha/love, harikoa/joy, and tūmanako/hope that your support makes possible.

# Our Tikanga/Values

Our tikanga, or our values, are what anchor us. They are the constant that define Crescendo and remind us of who and what we are and always want to be.



#### Manaakitanga

A fundamental principle of tikanga Māori, manaakitanga is about respecting the mana of others through care, nurturing and fostering positive relationships.

## Whanaungatanga

In this context, whanaungatanga is the state of being or becoming a family unit and speaks to the interconnectedness and sense of belonging.





## Āhurutanga

Āhurutanga is the act of providing a safe, supportive and nurturing environment, creating a sense of belonging and security. It links in with both whanaungatanga and manaakitanga in that manaakitanga enables āhurutanga to happen, which in turn creates a safe environment where whanaungatanga is able to take place.

### Our Challenge


The system created to help young people is broken. It sees young people as problems to be fixed, which reinforces what many young people already privately think about themselves. It is a self-perpetuating negative loop.

We know that Aotearoa has had over 67,000 youth not in employment, education or training (NEET)<sup>1</sup>. They grow 'silently disengaged' as a result of decreased mental health, events like COVID-19, and increasing social anxiety.

Te Ara Mahi Māori 2022 reported that in June 2021, 17.6% of Māori youth were not in education, employment, or training (NEET), which is double the rate of Pākehā (8.8%) and 6.8% above the national rate at 10.8%. Prolonged periods of unemployment or non-participation in education/training/employment lead to poorer outcomes later in life.

The majority of our rangatahi are of Māori (35%) and Pasifika (31%) descent. Many have had a poor experience in Aotearoa's traditional education system.

As Aotearoa's wealth gap increases, not all young people have access to the same resources and opportunities. When our rangatahi enter Crescendo's music mentoring programmes, we see many failing at school, from broken family structures, experiencing poverty and even homelessness. Some rangatahi have identity issues without positive role models to nurture their wellbeing, skills and talents.




#### Our Impact

With the support of our funders and partners, we make a life-changing impact by engaging rangatahi/young people through sound to inspire creative expression and engagement in goal-setting to help shape brighter futures in our communities. This is made possible through donations from generous Kiwis, philanthropic businesses, corporate sponsors and our social enterprise arm: Crescendo Studio.


We provide support via an asset-based model which allows rangatahi to be the drivers of their own development. As a result, we are nurturing and growing empowered rangatahi that demonstrate self-confidence and self-agency, increased trust in others and pride in their ability to identify their unique gifts. We strongly believe that anyone, given the right environment, encouragement and support can flourish into the best version of themselves.

We regularly measure the success of our programmes to ensure they are meeting our impact goals. This includes establishing a baseline by surveying our students on day one of the programme, regularly checking in with our rangatahi to monitor feedback during and asking for feedback before they graduate and transition to their next step.



## Youth Programmes

This course is definitely worth it, and (young people) can gain so much knowledge, not just about music but about yourself and your wellbeing.



Crescendo's music mentoring and wellbeing programmes are designed specifically for rangatahi/young people aged 15-24 and are free of charge. We provide industry-standard studio equipment and experienced musicians to mentor our rangatahi to help them navigate their chosen pathway and achieve their goals.

Over the last year, our Programmes Team has grown rapidly and an exciting new team has emerged to deliver our new **Crescendo's Pathway Programme**.

Our team's credentials span the industry, from world tours, major label album launches, to collectively achieving over 150 Music Industry Awards. Together, our mentoring team are proud to share their knowledge and experience in almost any creative industry and music genre (wins and losses!).



## Wellbeing

I was addicted to a lot of negative things, but coming to Crescendo made me feel like I didn't need to depend on those things to cope with stuff, and I could put anything I feel into a song.

Our programmes are founded in the Māori health model **Te Whare Tapa Whā**. The model describes health and wellbeing as a wharenui/meeting house with four walls. These four walls represent taha wairua (spiritual wellbeing), taha hinengaro (mental and emotional wellbeing), taha tinana (physical wellbeing) and taha whānau (family and social wellbeing). When one or more of these is out of balance, wellbeing is impacted, but when all things are in balance, we thrive.

Through our programmes, our mentors share and model these four pillars with our rangatahi/young people, because we believe the foundation to successfully building a positive future is positive mental health and wellbeing.

Our two-day workshops continue to provide a great taster of Crescendo programmes for rangatahi/young people who are unsure about their goals or are unable to commit to a full 9-week programme.

This year, we launched a new holiday workshop 'Rap, Bars & Beats' for budding rappers/MCs to deepen their knowledge and skills in the hip-hop genre. This has been a welcome addition to our Songwriting & Recording workshop to engage musical youth during the school holidays.

## Artist Journey Romayne (Roma) Bristowe Crescendo Graduate & Artist

Roma, age 17, felt hopeless at school. He was lacking direction and guidance and was struggling to find something he was passionate about. That was until his teacher suggested Crescendo.

He'd had a transient upbringing, moving around the North Island and living in many different homes. He was raised on old-skool hip hop, inspired by his mother's love of music (she was a DJ). Roma enjoyed writing poetry and had an interest in freestyle, but this was never fully realised until he joined our Crescendo programme.

Joining Crescendo was empowering for Roma. It was the first time he had ever chosen to do something purely for himself. He was excited to try something new and step out of his comfort zone.

"I was quite lost. I wasn't sure what to do. I was just going to school because there was nothing else to do. I didn't have a passion for anything."

Roma has now completed the Te Ara and Te Urunga programmes. He still visits the Crescendo Studio consistently and has written many songs of his own, collaborates on songs with other artists, delves deep into lyricism and flow, and shares input and ideas.

His progression serves as a testament to his craft. He started in the School Holiday Workshop and has since learned how to proficiently record himself, produce his vocals, and create a beat. He has not only acquired a critical ear for listening to and unpacking music but also made some useful connections in the music industry.

Roma (artist name pRieZt) has taken strides in his confidence and sense of self during his time with us. He now understands the importance of balance, and even though there's been a lot of ups and downs, he moves forward with an open heart and an open mind.

Through Crescendo, I have learned that even the most out-of-tune instruments can create a beautiful melody. It's not about music, it's about people and connection.

Roma has unearthed a true passion for music and serves as proof that everyone can create something extraordinary through connection and collaboration with others. Roma is an active member of Crescendo's Youth Advisory Group.

I've gained huge insights that have helped develop my music career in ways that when I started I wouldn't have even thought about.

## Youth Pathways Ryan Fairweather Crescendo Apprentice Audio Engineer

I learned about the Pathways Programme through Crescendo's Facebook page and immediately applied for the Audio Engineer Apprenticeship. Within five minutes I received a call from a Mentor and organised a meeting for the following week. The process was easy!

My role as an apprentice is very broad and I work with my Mentor on whatever live projects need to be delivered to clients. It includes music production, audio book recordings, and other skills sessions that help me prepare for work in the industry. We also learn about mental health and wellbeing to build self-confidence and resilience.

I'm enjoying working on a broad range of projects and specifically the Auckland Theatre Company job. It's a story set in the early '90s about a group of characters who are trying to break into the aerobics competition space. It's a heartwarming story about friendship, family and hard work. My role is anything from creating new music to other sounds like recording foley, vocals and dialogue.

It has been awesome to work with Auckland Theatre Company on Hyperspace and meet everyone involved in the production and everything going on behind the scenes. One of the key skills that I've learned is to collaborate within a professional environment. It's something I've not been exposed to before, to work hands-on instead of behind the books in theory. It's very 'in the moment' and the sort of skills and experience that I could not have learned elsewhere.

I'm really enjoying my apprenticeship at Crescendo, and it feels like everyone here is part of a family, supporting each other and holding us up to be the best we can be within the industry. It wasn't something I was necessarily looking for but I am so glad that I found Crescendo.

When I complete my apprenticeship, I want to pursue my career in audio engineering and build on the experience that I have gained and secure full-time work. I'm very grateful for this opportunity.

# Inspiring Youth Leadership InDuna Crescendo Graduate & Artist

InDuna is a South African born self-taught artist and music producer inspiring rangatahi across New Zealand. His Afropop infused soul sounds are influenced by the beats and stories of his homeland as well as his music idols, Brenda Fassie and Ladysmith Black Mambazo. InDuna's roots allow him to blend his vocals and sounds from Africa to bring a unique vibe and narrative to his music that capture the essence of him as an artist.

#### Thriving Despite Adversity

The adversity and challenges of growing up in a third world country have had a significant impact on InDuna and his music. Spending much of his early years growing up in the slums of Johannesburg and Limpopo he experienced a challenging childhood. After some time living in an orphanage at the age of eight, he jumped at the opportunity to move to New Zealand at age fourteen. Shortly after his move, InDuna found Crescendo which has had a major impact on his life:

We express our gratitude to Crescendo for their unwavering support.
With their help, I've not only been able to broaden my network since relocating to Auckland, but I've also experienced growth as a musician.

#### The Role of Music in Life & Recovery

InDuna started his music journey when he fell in love with music for the first time after hearing Brenda Fassie's Nomakanjani. "It felt like love at first sight, but with music." However, he only took an interest in producing his own music after leaving Secondary School. Creating and producing his music has served as an effective therapy for him. Music enables InDuna to express his emotions and to help cope with his past and present experiences.

#### Youth Leader & Influencer

InDuna is inspiring other rangatahi and demonstrating leadership in his own life by sharing his personal story of overcoming a rough start and embracing his origins. InDuna inspires other youth to take the opportunities presented or seek them out. It's this determination borne from hardship and hard work that has helped him to secure funding from the He Kākano Seed Fund, that supports aspiring entrepreneurs, to make his music dreams come true.


InDuna's single "Save Me" from his self-produced EP "Dreams of an Underdog" has racked up 58,000 views across YouTube and Facebook. "Black Man Running" reached number 1 on the RadioActive Top 11 Chart, 3rd on the SRN Top 10 Chart, 3rd on the iTunes NZ Hip-Hop Chart and 17th on the RadioScope Alternative Airplay Chart.



#### Crescendo Financials

Crescendo has been growing rapidly over the last three years reflected in the chart below. We saw 42% income growth from FY2021 to FY2022 which reversed the \$50,000 deficit to \$50,000 net income growth.

This was followed by additional income growth of 28% in FY2023. Our growth over the last three years has enabled us to deepen our impact with the young people/rangatahi that we serve. Our long-term vision/moemoeā is to develop Crescendo's Social Impact Hub to engage even more rangatahi through sound to help build positive futures in our communities.








# How You Can Support
